The artworks they created were 'out of the box' and easily relatable and definitive to Eastern India. They soaked in the surroundings of the place and foraged into imaginative expanses resulting into creativity that was a surreal representation of the place they called home for some time.

The Jute installations with organic clay by Yadhunandan N on the lush green lawns of the gallery were very impressive and a treat to the eyes. The artist twisted jute into abstract figures and bound them together with traces of clay. The abundance of jute in eastern India had caught the eye of the artist and his skills knew no bounds. A Naveen Kumar's experiment with sounds and textures of Bengal was commendable. He captured baul music and turned earthen cups into art. The use of coding to create a live experience for viewers was aweinspiring.

The use of technology along with the sense and smells of earthenware spoke of an artist rooted to the earth. Niranjan G M's painting which had Rabindranath Tagore and Buddha along with various other stalwarts was a dedication to the place he visited. It explained the trials and tribulations of life. His sketches left an indelible mark on the onlookers. A clay sculpture of marigolds which are the most commonly used flower in eastern India was created by him along with other sculptures too. The three artists carried home an experience they would cherish throughout their lives.

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
